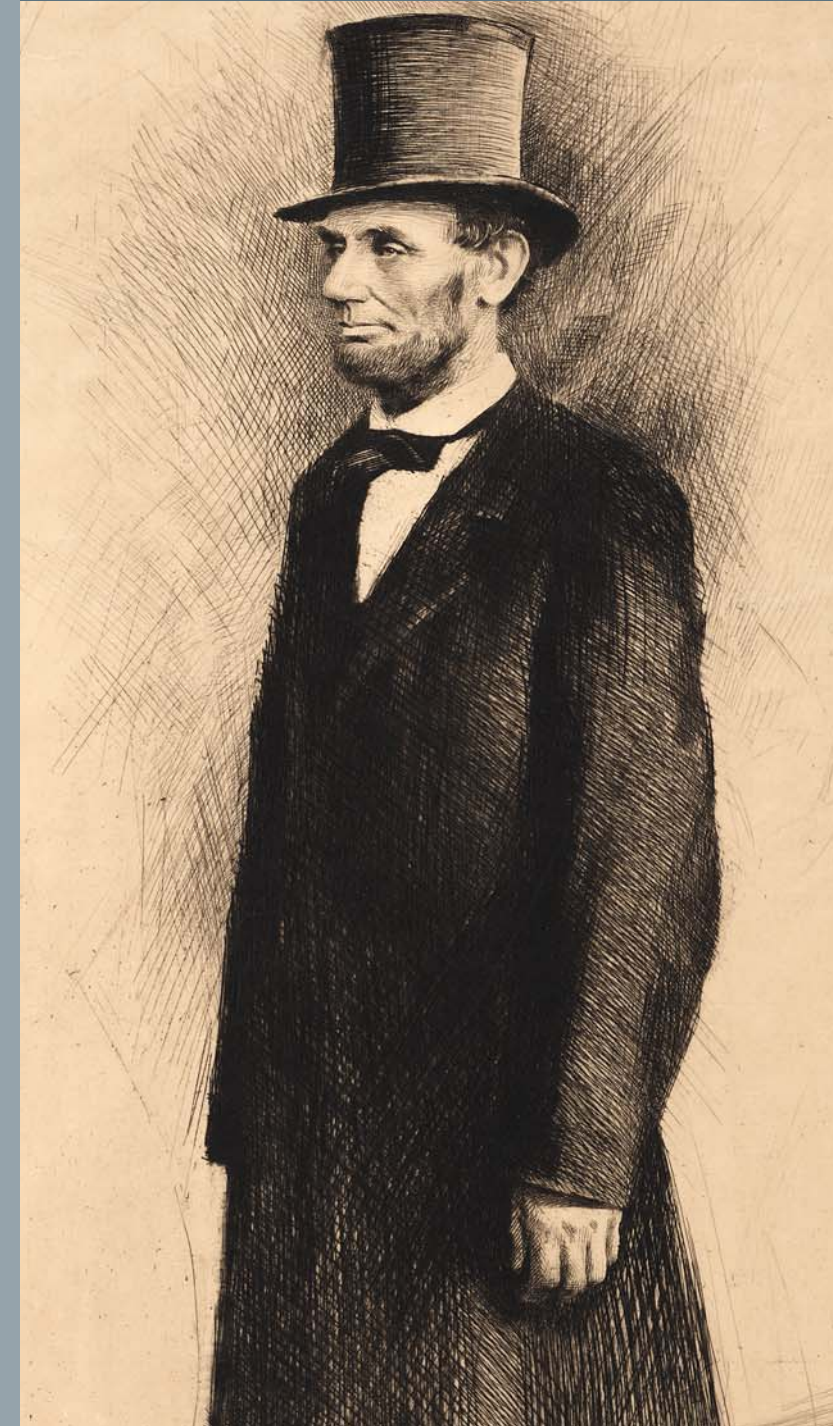

The Denver Public Library is honored to host "Lincoln: The Constitution and the Civil War" at the Blair-Caldwell African American Research Library. The Denver Public Library is one of only 25 host sites on the national tour of this compelling exhibition about Abraham Lincoln and the political and constitutional challenges of the Civil War. The exhibit was organized by the National Constitution Center and the American Library Association Public Programs Office. "Lincoln: the Constitution and the Civil War" has been made possible by a major grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Based upon an original interactive exhibit developed by the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia, this traveling version explores Lincoln's struggle to resolve the basic questions that divided Americans at the most perilous moment in the nation's history: Was the United States truly one nation, or was it a confederacy of sovereign and separate states? How could a country founded on the belief that "all men are created equal" tolerate slavery? In a national crisis, would civil liberties be secure?

Abraham Lincoln was a President of many political firsts:

- ◆ First successful candidate from the Republican Party to win the Presidency with his election in 1860.
- ◆ In 1864, his bid for re-election was the first split ticket campaign. His vice presidential running mate was Andrew Johnson, a Democrat.
- ◆ Sadly, Lincoln was the first president to be assassinated, and Andrew Johnson became the first president to be impeached. This remarkable collection of Lincoln campaign memorabilia also includes mourning pins and photographs made in memoriam.
